❖ INTRODUCTION:

Arrest in India is the apprehension of a person into custody, while bail is the conditional release of that person, allowing them to be free before trial. The process is governed by the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) and balances the state’s power to maintain law and order with an individual’s right to personal liberty guaranteed under Article 21 of the Constitution. Bail is an automatic right in “bailable” offenses, but for “non-bailable” offenses, it must be requested from a court.

❖ OBJECTIVES:

The objective of arrest is to prevent a suspect from escaping, destroying evidence, or committing further crimes, ensuring their appearance at trial. The main objective of bail is to ensure the accused appears in court for trial without the need for pre-trial detention, and to prevent unnecessary imprisonment of individuals who have not been convicted.

❖ PURPOSE:

➤ Arrest:

- Purpose: Arrest is a preventive measure to ensure a person appears for investigation and trial.
- Authority: A person can be arrested with or without a warrant depending on the offense.
- Rights of the arrested: The arrested person has the right to know the grounds of arrest and be informed of the charges, and a right to a lawyer.



➤ **Bail:**

- Purpose: Bail provides temporary release from custody, pending the outcome of a case.
- Bailable offenses: These are minor offenses where bail is a matter of right. The accused can get bail at the police station by providing a surety bond.
- Non-bailable offenses: These are more serious offenses where bail is not automatic and must be applied for from a court. The court will decide whether to grant bail based on the circumstances.
- Bail bond: In many cases, the accused must sign a bail bond, which is an agreement to appear in court and cooperate with the investigation. Failure to comply can lead to the issuance of a warrant for their arrest.
